SEXUAL AND RELATIONSHIP VIOLENCE SUPPORT SERVICES (SRVSS)

SRVSS empowers, encourages and validates those affected by power-based personal violence, educates the community about healthy relationships, places an emphasis on bystander action and advocates for social change towards a university-wide intolerance to harm.

SRVSS provides services regardless of gender, where incident occurred, when incident occurred or by whom.

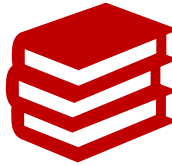
